New England has some amazing diving opportunities. However, when it comes to wrecks, it doesn't even come close to the variety or well preserved wrecks found in the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario. Steel freighters, wooden schooners, paddle wheelers, and even a wooden dredge barge complete with scoop and time period tools are just a few examples of the possibilities for this year. We've had great weather and fun diving for the last 4 years. I'm hoping for more of the same this year. It's not often that you have the opportunity to explore well preserved wooden sailing ships, modern freighters, or an exhilarating drift along one of the vertical river walls all in a single trip. Rockport is only about 6.5 hours or so from Boston and it's well worth the trip!

The majority of our New England maritime heritage lies out of range for recreational divers. Even for those of us that choose to dive these wrecks, we only get a brief 20 minutes on the bottom. In the St.

Lawrence and Lake Ontario, similar maritime history lies well within the recreational range (60 - 120 ft.). We even throw in a few fun river drifts that are a great ride and occasionally yield some great bottles and other artifacts. August water temperatures can be as high as the mid 70s. This year we are going to be splitting our time evenly between the river and the Lake.

Once again we will be staying at Caigers Country Inn and Resort. This quaint little family run resort is a great base of operations. It's a quick walk from your room to the boat and we can be diving within minutes. There are few restaurants close by but I hope to continue our tradition of evening cookouts by the river. Dates: August 13th through the 17th

Dives: at least 2 to 3 dives per day

Cost: Approximately \$700

covers 3 nights lodging (double occupancy), 4 days scheduled charters, tips and air fills. Nitrox and additional dives are not included.
